-John Proctor was married to Elizabeth Hubbard on January 12, 1791 at Madison County, Kentucky. He married Sarah Green, the widow of Moses Evans, at Madison County, Kentucky, on 29 September 1825.

-John's wife Elizabeth died in 1828. Together they had 12 children: Anna, Reubon, John, George, Benjamin, William, Sally, Elizabeth, Silas, Fannie, Matilda, and Joseph. (emailed file, Proctor Family Genealogy Forum).

-John was in the military during the Revolutionary War. He was in the Home Guard

-"He was a personal friend of Daniel Boone and Col. Calloway, he had heard so much about the new territory west of the Mississippi River. He decided to return with them on their second or third trip. He was looking for a lot of cheap land. He left his youngest daughter in care of a married sister and left for Missouri. His son, William, joined him at a later date in Missouri. He settled in Florissant Valley, St. Louis Co. Due to much malaria in the region they decided to push further into the interior of Missouri. John went with Boone who had settled north of Fayette, Missouri. John went on to the adjoining county to the north--Macon Co."

-The Brantley Family Tree on Ancestry.com states that John had 9 children with Elizabeth Hubbard, 2 with Sarah Green and 5 with Mary Polly Moore.

-Brothers Nicholas and Reuben were in the Revolutionary War in Captain John Holder's Company At and Near Boonesborough in June 1779. (Ancestry.com. Boonesborough: its founding, pioneer struggles, Indian experiences, Transylvania days and Revolutionary annals)

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
