Which Pioneer wagon train took the family west? Willard Richards Company left Winter Quarters July 3, 1848 and arrived Oct. 10. James Madison, Agnes Haley, Carlotty L., William Jordan, and Sarah James.

-It is said that when William was 11 the family was living in Cottonwood. Before their house was built Sarah was sleeping in a wagon box with one of the family's recently freed slaves, Liz. Sarah was three. One night she woke up crying and accused Liz of pinching her. This happened a second time that night so Green, another freed slave that accompanied the family to Utah decided

to sleep next to the wagon box. He was woken up when a coyote bit him. He chased it off and the next morning they shot the coyote. (Sarah James Flake Levie, Compiled by Neldon Lee Fox, pp.1-2)

-Sarah married Joseph Hyrum Levi in January of 1866. By 1880 Joseph had remarried. Sarah wove baskets from willow branches to support her six children. Sarah remarried to Philip Oakden.
