Where was the family in the 1850 U. S. Census? Great Salt Lake county Martha Ann Noah age 43 and her daughter Sarah A. Matthews age 17, house #302, p.45. Just next door in house #301 was her daughter Mahala, son-in-law, and two grandchildren.

Which Pioneer wagon train took the family west? The family consisting of Martha and her children James age 19, Sarah age 13, and Mary age 17, and Mahala age 19 (married to John Thomas) with the Hunter Foutz Company on June 19, 1847 from the Elkhorn River and arrived Oct. 1, 1847.

Any interesting facts or stories that might have been submitted.

-his wife Martha Ann was married to Thomas Mathis (Matthews) prior to her marriage to Pleasant in 1846. With Thomas Martha had James Nicholas, Mahala Jane, Mary Catherine, and Sarah Ann.

-Martha's first husband Thomas was killed by Indians in Mississippi. Martha died of consumption in 1852, the same year that her daughter Sarah Ann was married. (<https://familysearch.org/photos/artifacts/26277095>) Other sources say she died Nov. 1855
