Which Pioneer wagon train took the family west? Came west with the Harry Walton Company in 1851. About 21 families from Garden Grove plus other individuals and 60 wagons were in the company when it began its journey from the outfitting post at Kanessville, Iowa. They left Garden Grove, Iowa on 17 May 1851.

1807-1868) Horace Ephraim Roberts was born on April 1, 1807 in Liberty, Ohio. He married Harriet McEvers. In 1851 the family immigrated to Utah. Horace was known as Potter Roberts because he was a potter by trade. After Horace and Harriet made their home in Provo, President Brigham Young asked Horace to put up a pottery shop because people were short of dishes and such things. The potter shop soon became known all around the country and the poor were supplied with dishes as well as the well-to-do. Horace never denied anyone anything, and would take what they offered for pay, i.e. Potatoes, eggs, molasses, butter, flour, wheat or anything else that people could spare in exchange for dishes. If his family couldn't use it he would trade it for

something they could use. He would send young men out with wagon loads of pottery, packed in straw, grass or sawdust, to sell for him. Horace's shop was a large adobe building. The lower floor he used for crockery ware and the upper floor for a dance hall.; where the tickets were paid with home-made candles, squash, carrots, etc. He died December 24, 1868 in Provo, Utah.
