Where was the family in the 1850 U. S. Census? Aroet and Alma: Great Salt Lake County, Utah, house #129.

Which Pioneer wagon train took the family west? Heber C. Kimball Company left Winter Quarters Jun. 7, 1848 and arrived Sep. 24, 1848. Alma Helaman 12, Aroet Lucius 20, Rachel 18, Solomon Henry 9.

-Both Johnathan and his wife Olive died at Cutler's Park, leaving their children orphans. (Logan Temple: The First 100 Years, Nolan P. -Four days after Johnathan died Olive also died of chills and fever. Before passing away she made Aroet promise to bring the family to the mountains as the church leaders instructed. -The two youngest Hale children, Clarissa and Olive Susan also died at Cutler's Park within two weeks of their mother's death. -Aroet, Alma, and Solomon did so much work for the dead at the Logan temple that for two nights it glowed with a holy light. This was several years before electric lighting was installed in the Logan temple. When President Wilford Woodruff was told of the circumstances he said it was “an assembly of the great Hale family from the spirit world, who had gathered within those sacred walls in exultation over their liberation through the beneficent ministrations in their behalf.” Bishop Johnathan H. -In 1854 Aroet and his family moved from Salt Lake to Grantsville where he had bought a farm. At the request of President Young he helped settle Las Vegas, Nevada but in 1856 returned to Grantsville. In 1886 he was called to help settle Star Valley, Wyoming. He spent two years in Wyoming. In 1906 Aroet was called to be a patriarch. -Shortly after arriving in Utah Rachel married Lucas Hoagland. He had been in the Heber C. Kimball company too. Shortly after their marriage Lucas went to California as a freighter for a year and a half. After that Lucas returned and brought Rachel with him to San Bernardino. Here Rachel gave birth prematurely and due to dropsy became blind. Rachel died at age 25 and was the first white woman buried in San Bernardino. (<https://www.findagrave.com/memorial/31887663>)
