Which Winter Quarters Ward or Iowa Branch was the family: Winter Quarters 21st ward

Where was the family in the 1850 U. S. Census? Iron County, Utah house number 71, page 22.

Which Pioneer wagon train took the family west? It's uncertain which wagon train they took but they arrived in Salt Lake early in 1850. David later returned from a mission with the John W. Berry Company. This company left May 10, 1858 and arrived on June 21st.

Any interesting facts or stories that might have been submitted.

-His father David owned several mills in Mill Creek Canyon and helped build Fort Holladay. (Heart throbs of the West) He led 221 Saints from England to America on the steamship Manhattan. (Our Pioneer Heritage, vol. 12)

-David Brinton's father died shortly before he turned 4. On June 11, 1843 he was baptized for his father. (Baptisms for the Dead, Nauvoo, p. 491-92.)
